## Science 7

Accelerated Reader Goals, for 2nd Grade through 6th Grade finish up on January 17th, 2020. We will then be taking a test to set our new goals for the 3rd quarter. Please take the time to ask your child about AR and how they are doing, they should be trying to read every night to reach their goals.

6th \& 5th Graders have been working with Lego Mindstorms during their Library times. This program works on building a robot and programming the robot to perform certain actions. One program you may be familiar with is like a vacuum robot that many people have at home. We will also program the robots to stay inside a box, to follow a line, and have a robot battle. 4th \& 3rd Graders have been working on 3D projects where they will be designing either a keychain or some type of object that they have designed. We use a CAD program called 1,2,3d Design. This program allows us to design, import pictures, and make them 3D. Once they have their design done we will print them on our 3D printer. 1st Graders have built a catapult using pop cycle sticks and ping pong balls. 2nd Graders have been working very hard on their AR program.

4K-4th Grade finished up their fitnessgram testing and will be doing it again for the 2nd quarter. They will try to beat their personal best times. The testing includes the pacer test (endurance), arm hang (strength), shuttle run (lateral quickness), and sit-ups (core strength).

We will also be looking at bringing back the roller skating unit in January, the students really enjoy learning these skills such as skating forward, backward, crossover steps, and learning multiple stops. We usually have K-4th grade doing this at the Elementary level.
